Just a week after launching our **Jacks are Vaxed** promotion, I'm pleased to report that thousands of students have voluntarily uploaded proof of vaccination. I'm excited—and a bit envious!—that one of our students will have the opportunity to get a signed Devin Booker Phoenix Suns jersey in recognition of their commitment to community health as part of this week's drawing. We have other exciting prizes to give away as well, including a 100-block meal plan and \$200 Safeway gift card this week.

More importantly, the number of vaccinated people on our campus is a testament to the community of care throughout our student population. Many of you have taken the crucial step of getting vaccinated. As the start of the semester approaches, we continue to learn more about the role COVID-19 will continue to play in a post-pandemic future. Vaccination is, and will remain, the key tool to protect ourselves, our families, and our community. I encourage you to stay informed and take advantage of the vaccination resources available at NAU. Lumberjacks at the Olympics

Like many of you, I've been enjoying the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. It is extra exciting this year because three Lumberjacks are competing on the biggest athletic stage.

Senior **Luis Grijalva**, a member of our NCAA national champion men's cross country teams in 2017, 2018, and 2020, will be running the 5,000-meter race on August 3, representing Guatemala. Luis' story hits close to home. As an immigrant with DACA status, he has been able to realize his dream as a student-athlete at NAU. I am thankful for the tremendous support he has received,

which enabled him to travel and compete at the Olympics, and grateful for the NAU excellence he represents both in and out of competition. Luis' journey serves as a poignant reminder that we must reaffirm our commitment to access and justice in higher education.

We also have another Lumberjack joining Luis in the 5,000-meter race. David McNeill, who ran cross country at NAU from 2007-2010, is representing Australia in Tokyo. As a Lumberjack, David was a nine-time All-American in both cross country and track.

I'll be setting my alarm for 4 a.m. local time on August 3 to cheer on Luis and David—and hope you will, too!

Finally, alumna Brooke Andersen will be representing the U.S. in the women's hammer throw. Brooke, who graduated in 2018, was an All-American thrower and Big Sky record-holder at NAU. She finished in second place at the Olympic trials last month, and I'm excited to see her continued excellence on the international stage. She competes in the preliminary competition on Saturday evening. Go Brooke!

In other news from Lumberjack Athletics, I want to share that NAU has been awarded the **Big Sky Presidents' Cup** for 2020-21—the fourth time our university has been awarded this prestigious honor. It is given annually to the school that excels both academically and athletically.

I want to offer my congratulations to our student-athletes for their dedication to their studies and their success in their athletic endeavors. This recognition makes me more excited than ever to kick off the academic year and join our NAU community in cheering on our Lumberjack sports teams.
