

Program highlight: Inclusive Recreation

The Northern Arizona Inclusive Recreation Project is a partnership between IHD, the Arizona Developmental Disabilities Planning Council (ADDPC), High Country Adaptive Sports (HCAS), and other local organizations.

The Northern Arizona Inclusive Recreation Project provides:



Adaptive kayaking and hiking excursions to individuals with I/DD, including adaptive equipment and safety gear.



Skiing and snowboard lessons,

using the adaptive equipment purchased through the ADDPC grant, take place at the Arizona Snowbowl just outside of Flagstaff.





Community Service

Providing Direct Services

IHD provided services and supports to 5,675 individuals with disabilities, their families, and service providers to promote increased access and inclusion. IHD's community service programs include:

Early Childhood Initiatives

■ The Growing in Beauty Partnership Program (GIBPP) works with the Navajo Nation to provide early intervention services for young children suspected of having a disability.

GIBPP services include:

Physical Therapy Occupational Therapy Speech Language Pathology

- 201 children were referred to the Growing in Beauty Program.
- children were found eligible for early intervention and had a family service plan developed.
- children received services for over a year.
- children per month, on average, were provided therapy by GIBPP therapists.



■ The Play and Language for Autistic Youngsters (PLAY) Project

is an evidence-based, intensive developmental intervention that supports caregivers in engaging children with autism in a playful way to help them achieve their full potential.

With funding from ADDPC, IHD trained a team of professionals to implement the PLAY intervention for children on the Navajo Nation.

A **PLAY** workshop was also featured at the IHD Evidence for Success Disability Conference.

Assistive Technology (AT) Services

IHD is a leader in AT services in Arizona and houses a number of initiatives related to the field. AT includes products, software, or other devices used to assist functionality and independent living for persons with disabilities.

■ Arizona's Technology Access Program (AzTAP) is Arizona's AT resource program, funded under the federal Assistive Technology Act. AzTAP offers a range of AT services throughout the state, many of which are free to all Arizona residents.

■ The Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) Evaluation and Training Program helps individuals with speech and language challenges find devices to improve communication.



7 trainings were provided to over **2,500** participants

150 demonstrations of AT devices for **480** individuals





\$48,041 in loans were provided for purchase of AT, such as hearing aids and mobility devices

629 equipment loans for **1,935** AT devices were provided to **625+** Arizona residents



With funding from the American Rescue Plan, **AzTAP's Adaptive Gaming Clinic** launched in June 2022.

The clinic works one-on-one with adults and children with disabilities to identify accessibility features and adaptive equipment for them to participate in video gaming.



The AAC program provided:

110 evaluations

427 hours of training on AAC devices to **294** clients and their caregivers



■ The Assistive Technology for Employment and Independent Living (ATEI) program is a new contract providing assistive technology services to help Arizona vocational rehabilitation clients reach their employment/independent living goals.

The Arizona Economic Security and Rehabilitation Services Administration funded ATEI for a total of \$5 Million over four years.

Services to be provided include:

- AT assessments/evaluations
- Short-term AT device loans
- Client-specific AT product purchases

Pre-Service Preparation Educating & Training

IHD's Pre-Service Training and Community Education initiatives consist of interdisciplinary programs that foster professional growth and development for individuals working in disability-related fields.

During the 2021-2022 academic year

IHD offered 27 courses, reaching a total of 405 students.



Academic Programs

■ The Disability Studies (DS) Minor is an undergraduate program that focuses on the historical and legal treatment of individuals with disabilities, as well as the role of disability in contemporary society.

■ The Assistive Technology (AT)
Certificate Program trains graduate
students and professionals to utilize
assistive technology tools when providing
services to individuals with disabilities.

■ The Supporting Inclusive Practices in College (SIP-C) program supports students with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities in attending and succeeding in postsecondary education. SIP-C is supported by the U.S. Department of Education TPSID award and funding from the Arizona Developmental Disabilities Planning Council.

IHD identified, recruited, and prepared15 individuals to participate in theSIP-C program.

Other Training and Community Education Projects

■ The Special Education Learning
Experience for Competency in Teaching
(SELECT) program is funded by the Arizona
Department of Education and provides
graduate-level courses and professional
development to school-based personnel.

35 SELECT courses offered590 individuals participated



■ Project SCOPE: Supporting Children of the Opioid Epidemic is a national initiative providing training to interdisciplinary teams on screening, monitoring, and caring for children who are impacted by opioid use. This project is supported by the Wyoming Institute for Disabilities, the Nisonger Center at Ohio State University, and the University of Cincinnati Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities.

2 courses consisting of

lessons on topics such as substance use treatment, advocacy, and resources.

172 individuals participated



■ The Interdisciplinary Training Clinic offers free health evaluations and recommendations to children and families. It serves as a training experience for NAU graduate students in health and education fields. The clinic is partly funded by a donation from John & Lynn Schiek.

6 clinics were held providing **evaluations** to **12** children



■ The American Indian Vocational Rehabilitation Training and Technical Assistance Center (AIVRTTAC) provides training and technical assistance to the 93 American Indian Vocational Rehabilitation Services (AIVRS) projects



IHD was awarded a five-year,

\$5 million renewal grant from the federal RSA to continue housing AIVRTTAC, now in partnership with the Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation (TVR) Institute at Northwest Indian College.

AIVRTTAC held an "AIVRS Academy" training in June 2022, attended by 77 staff from 27 AIVRS projects

Research & Evaluation

Investigating & Analyzing

IHD's team of researchers are experts in the disability disciplines of medicine, psychology, speech-language pathology, and education. The team is engaged in research that has direct implications for disability-related practice.

By the end of June 2022

31 grant proposals were submitted

13 proposals were funded and 9 were pending

articles were submitted for publication in peer-reviewed journals



research findings presentations were delivered

Research Projects:

- **The Culturally Appropriate Research** in American Indian Employment (CARE) Project studies the practices and policies used by American Indian Vocational Rehabilitation Services (AIVRS) projects, with the goal of learning what practices have been most useful in helping American Indians with disabilities find jobs. It is funded by a grant from the Administration on Community Living.
- **■** Developing a Collaborative Infrastructure for Educating STEM **Undergraduate Students Who Are Neurodiverse Learners** is a collaboration between NAU and other universities across the nation focused on increasing the number of students with autism.

ADHD, and other diverse neurological disabilities who succeed in post-secondary STEM education. The project is funded by a grant from the National Science Foundation.





- **TAPDINTO-STEM** is an ongoing research project funded by a National Science Foundation (NSF) INCLUDES grant to empower people with disabilities for success in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) disciplines. IHD had 12 applicants and selected 5 students for our first cohort.
- Health and Disabilities-Related Research is conducted by the University of Arizona program site through a sub-award from IHD. It emphasizes public health surveillance of birth defects, developmental disabilities, and genetic conditions.

Dissemination Sharing & Informing

IHD's dissemination team is responsible for ensuring IHD materials are available to a broad audience. The team develops, produces, and shares information in a variety of mediums, ensuring accessibility for all.



Dissemination staff assists with providing online and virtual services, training, and learning opportunities.

To ensure resources are accessible to a wide audience, updates and revisions have been made to IHD websites, brochures, and information sheets.

Dissemination staff assisted in a branding project, creating a series of large wall displays that provide information about IHD to visitors.



The dissemination staff manages the IHD email list of over **800 participants**. This list is our primary tool for sharing highlights, research articles, and webinar announcements throughout the year.

Conferences

Over the last 24 years, IHD's Evidence for Success Disability Conference has become one of the largest disability-related statewide conferences in Arizona. Focused primarily on providing professional development education and training, the conference highlights several IHD focus areas, and features as many as 70 educational sessions as well as a large exhibit hall.

In the period covered in this report, IHD hosted two conferences: a VIRTUAL conference in July 2021 and a HYBRID conference in June 2022.

IHD Evidence for Success VIRTUAL Disability Conference
